

## Somer Valley Breastfeeding Welcome: Information for Venues

By signing up to the Breastfeeding Welcome scheme, businesses and venues are contributing to helping babies get the best start, by supporting and empowering parents to feed when out and about. The Breastfeeding Welcome scheme is an easy way for businesses and venues to support breastfeeding.

## Why is it important to provide a breastfeeding welcome space?

- Eight out of ten mothers will stop breastfeeding before they want to. The reasons for this include: a lack of access to support services in the community and at work, cultural barriers and misinformation. Increasing the frequency of mothers breastfeeding in public, is likely to contribute to the reduction of stigma around breastfeeding<sup>1</sup>.
- The Equality Act (2010) states that it is discrimination to treat a parent unfavourably because they are breastfeeding. It applies to anyone providing services, benefits, facilities and premises to the public, public bodies, further and higher education bodies and association<sup>2</sup>.
- Breastfeeding rates in Somer Valley are lower than in other areas of Bath and North East Somerset<sup>3</sup>.
- The World Health Organisation recommends exclusive breastfeeding for about the first 6 months, with continued breastfeeding along with introducing appropriate complementary foods for up to 2 years of age or longer<sup>4</sup>.

According to UNICEF<sup>5</sup> Breastfeeding has the following benefits:

- **Infant health:** Breastfeeding protects children from a vast range of illnesses, including infection, diabetes, asthma, heart disease and obesity, as well as sudden infant death syndrome
- **Maternal health:** Breastfeeding also protects mothers from breast and ovarian cancers and heart disease
- **Relationship-building:** Breastfeeding supports the mother-baby relationship
- **Cost savings:** Breastfeeding contributes to significant savings to the NHS.
- **Supporting breastfeeding can help mitigate climate change**: It is a "green" infant feeding practice compared to infant formula<sup>6</sup>.

## What do we need to do to sign up?
